


- Lookout point targeted to be planted.
- Parks and reserves in town could be further enhanced with removal of stumps/new planting e.g. King George V Park.
- On Broadway, have pedestrian crossings, with trees to soften street and slow traffic.
- Perhaps have climbers/ramblers up verandah posts and along verandahs of commercial centre. Each shop responsible for their own climbers. Not the "Wanganui hanging baskets" but "Reefton's Ramblers" - which need not be roses!
- Lack of amenity plantings in public space but herbaceous flower plantings are not necessarily appropriate.
- More trees required around playgrounds.

MANAGEMENT


- Replace those trees that are cut down.
- Protect trees from vandalism and rough play. With community effort vandalism may be reduced.
- Plant more mature trees that are less easy to vandalise.
- Investigate an "Adopt a Tree" scheme for schools or families.
- Provide for the community to look after their trees.



Note: There are other trees within Reefton which make an important contribution to the townscape. Property owners and occupiers are to be encouraged to retain and maintain such trees. Other trees need to be assessed for inclusion in the District Plan.



- Lack of fences, or low and often see-through.
- Residential back-lanes (for coal & night cart) with taller/solid fences
- Timber town + corrugated iron.
- Chimneys and flues.
- Percentage coverage of section for residential is small spaciousness

- Define a maximum floor area to reduce sprawl.
- Define a maximum building height.
- ♦ Minimise fences maintaining 1.0m maximum height if built.
- Avoid amalgamation of sections, removal of trees.
- Develop a design code for colour, form and materials.










Workshop recommendations:


- D.O.C. to organise a remedial work plan:
 - for Reefton Courthouse and Reefton School of Mines within six months.
- ♦ Inangahua Community Board:
 - make immediate recommendation to Council to save the Inangahua County Council building and to carry out remedial work.
 - recommendation to Reefton Historic Places Trust Board that remedial plan and action for Oddfellows' Hall is urgent.
 - seek to purchase Railway Station for community. Ask immediately Council to approach D.O.S.L.I. (Dept. of Survey & Land Information) to gift building.
 - seek to secure engine shed from Tranz Rail and attract funding from Rail Heritage Trust and Buller District Council tourism grant Green project team within 2 months.
 - Rail Heritage Trust of New Zealand and labour input for the project from the Buller District Council "Task Force Green" team, within two months.




- Reefton Gateway Group Inc.
- Immediate work priorities identified plus resources.
- Longer term look at maintenance / restoration
- Recommend that B.D.C. revise and correct heritage listings in Proposed District Plan, and include additional heritage buildings/sites, research and inventory them.
- Recommendation to B.D.C. that appropriate provisions be written and incorporated into the Buller District Plan to protect buildings and identify appropriate alterations - conservation plans, adoption of I.C.O.M.O.S. N.Z. Charter.
- Recommend to B.D.C. that design guidelines be written for heritage areas and incorporate wider Reefton area such as Waiuta, Big River, and Murray Creek. Guidelines should be developed through community consultation.
- Suggest consideration be given to moving the slab hut from Broadway (commercial zone) to the recreation area on the Strand, as the building is not of mainstreet character or scale. Consider having the hut open and working - to enjoy a live "cup of tea"!

For future development, controls and guidelines are sought to protect the character of the town. It has been lucky that most of the dominant architectural styles of recent decades have impacted little on Reefton. The town is therefore in the enviable position of being able to direct future development to respect the character that makes Reefton distinctive.


Distinctiveness is what the visitor industry seeks, and Reefton has the chance to retain and enhance this asset to allow for capitalising on future opportunities in tourism.

Tourism is only sustainable when it meets visitor needs, the community aspirations, and protects and enhances the environment. The key element in the success of regional tourism will be the development of pro-active, long term strategies, quality tourism products, and co-operative marketing.

Thus, for both Residential and Commercial Zones, a framework for building is defined. The suggested rules and guidelines are general enough to provide opportunity for very imaginative and individual expression within a general theme. They are devised to allow people to continue with the typical styles and initiate innovative new things, but protect the Reefton character from unsympathetic developments that alone or cumulatively could degrade the specialness of this place.

The proposals were developed during the Reefton Revival workshop. Following further community discussion, it is proposed that the management sought for both residential and commercial zones now be adopted in the District Plan as **guidelines** only. The situation can be regularly reviewed, and when appropriate, the community may choose to seek a variation to the Plan to develop **rules**, as expressed below.









Management sought:


- Street set-back of 6m. minimum.
- Side yards of 5m. minimum.
- Built site coverage maximum of 30 %.
- No garages in front yard.
- Accessory buildings "discretionary" into side and rear yards.
- Accessory buildings maximum height 2.4m to eave and maximum 45° pitch.
- Retain range of roof forms, with house roofs of between 25° and 45° pitch required.
- Encourage retention of flues and chimneys.
- All buildings oriented parallel to street.
- Garage entrance aligned parallel to street.
- Maximum building height to eaves of 6m.
- Exterior colours, not white or pale, but richer and mid- to darker (refer colour palette samples).
- Preferred building materials are those traditional to Reefton horizontal timber and corrugated steel as "permitted" materials.
- Horizontal weatherboards of ship-lap, rusticated and tongue-andgroove form are encouraged through guidelines.
- Horizontal corrugated steel cladding demonstrated in guidelines.





FENCES


- 1m. high boundary fences permitted.
- Discretionary for open design boundary fences over 1m high.
- Taller fences, solid or open, permitted to back lanes. Noncomplying on other boundaries. Limit solid fences over 1 metre high, to retain open, friendly streetscapes.


Management sought:


- · No set back of wall, and no side yard
- Verandahs with timber posts required for single storey buildings on Broadway.
- Verandahs discretionary for 2-storey buildings.
- Encourage instalment of timber verandah posts.
- Encourage sign writing on the face of a building and verandah, not attached on an angle to building or hung underneath a verandah.
- Maximum building height 2-storey.
- Pitched roofs similar to original, 25 45%
- Encourage parapets retaining/creating a main street "wall" or frame.
- Timber and corrugated steel as permitted external materials.
- Discourage masonry buildings through discretionary status.
- Encourage traditional and rich colours (see colour palette).
- Discourage exterior white surfaces or details, through guidelines.
- Encourage vertical window pattern.
- Define a suggested maximum percentage wall area having window openings on upper floors.
- Encourage maximum glazing on ground floor frontages above the plinth space (see drawing).


BUILDING COLOURS


- Encourage continued use of rich, bright colours. Celebrate the town within the forest clearing - "The Coast's bright spot!"
- Encourage the use of heritage colours on all buildings on Broadway; on heritage buildings; and, on Council-owned buildings.
- Heritage colours can be used as a promotion e.g. for old homes.
- Lucky Dip, Band Hall, Armstrongs on Broadway, Visitor Centre enjoyed as good colour scheme examples - they "look right" although not necessarily Heritage Colours. Colour is a Reefton feature that could be developed for photogenic distinctiveness.
- Avoid use of white on any exterior surfaces, particularly on Broadway.
- Signs colour coded depending on where used or what for i.e. for heritage buildings, walks, etc.
- Link information brochure colours to streets and buildings.

An example of how buildings that are set back rather than built on the boundary could be integrated into the Rection street character.

WORKSHOP PROCESS

PREPARATION

- The Reefton Revival process was established from an informal meeting of members of the community (participants list 1) with Di Lucas on Monday 22 January 1996 in the Visitors Centre.
- Meeting participants unanimously recommended that a workshop be held within a month to establish a vision for the town. Lucas Associates was requested to facilitate the process. A co-ordinating group was formed, including Ray Armstrong, Sharron Barrington, Ronnie Buckman, Steve Hawes, Cr. Christina Hunt, Brenda Kaye, Cr. Graeme Neylon, Craig Shearson and Paul Thomas.
- To inform the wider community, advertisements were run on 12th and 19th February in The Clarion, the local community newsletter, informing people of the impending Reefton Revival workshop and encouraging local participation.
- A flier and poster were drafted. Posters were widely displayed and the flier was delivered to each household and business in Reefton and the surrounding area.
- Advertisements were run on the Radio Scenicland community noticeboard.
- Others with particular interest in the area were contacted directly, including representation from the Runanga of Katiwaewae; Tourism West Coast and Transit N.Z.
- Prior to 19 February, Cr. Graeme Neylon filed a cross-submission seeking consideration of the "people's plan", the workshop outcomes, in the Reefton section of the Buller District Plan.

WORKSHOP

- The community workshop was held on Saturday 24 (8 a.m. to noon, and 4 p.m. to 8 p.m.) and Sunday 25 February (1 p.m. to 6 p.m.) in the Community Centre. It was open to the public to come and go at any time. Some 50 people participated in the workshop each day, including a mix of ages, interests and origins.
- A crèche was provided at the workshop. Several children at the crèche also participated in the workshop by painting Reefton Revival report covers (see front of this document).





Excerpts from PROPOSED BULLER DISTRICT PLAN

Objective 4.3.1 (page 33) To recognise, and wherever possible, protect and enhance the distinctive character of settlements in Buller District without stifling innovative and creative design.

In addition to the 5 policies to recognise main street, historic buildings, Paparoa development and commercial advertising, to recognise the desired Reefton character, additional policies are sought:

The design and height of residential buildings

Implementation methods include:

Develop and include rules to protect the main street character of Reefton including:

- requiring building frontages to have an entrance on the main street and have a commercial activity at ground floor level.
- requiring verandahs on all commercial buildings with a main street frontage when building work is undertaken or resource consent required.
- requiring new buildings and alterations to existing buildings to be built up to the street frontage.

Promote and provide information on appropriate design techniques for the main streets of settlements.

Investigate the relevance and potential of "Main Street" programmes ..

Encourage the incorporation of historic features into new developments.





1COMOS NEW ZEALAND CHARTER FOR THE CONSERVATION OF PLACES OF CULTURAL HERITAGE VALUE

PREAMBLE

New Zealand retains a unique assemblage of places of cultural heritage value relating to its indigenous and its more recent peoples. These areas, landscapes and features, buildings, structures and gardens, archaeological and traditional altes, and sacred places and monuments are beasures of distinctive value. New Zealand thares a general responsibility with the rest of humanity to safeguard its cultural heritage for present and future generations. More specifically, New Zealand peoples have particular ways of perceiving, conserving and relating to their cultural heritage.

Following the spirit of the International Charter for the Conservation and Restoration of Monuments and Sites (the Venice Charter 1966), this charter sets out principles to goide the conservation of places of autural heritage value in New Zealand. It is intended as a frame of reference for all those who, as owners, territorial authorities, tradespersons or professionals, are involved in the different aspects of such work. It aims to provide guidelines for community leaders, organisations and individuals concerned with conservation issues. It is a statement of professional practice for members of ICOMOS New Zealand.

Each section of the charter should be read in the light of all the others. Definitions of terms used are provided in section 27.

Accordingly this charter has been adopted by the New Zealand National Committee of the International Council on Monuments and Sites at its Annual General Meeting on 4 October 1997.

1. THE PURPOSE OF CONSERVATION

The purpose of conservation is to care for places of cultural heritage value, their structures, materials and cultural meaning. In general, such places:

- (i) have lasting values and can be appreciated in their own right;
- (ii) teach us about the past and the culture of those who came before us;
- (iii) provide the context for community identity whereby people relate to the land and to those who have gone before;
- (iv) provide variety and contrast in the modern world and a measure against which we can compare the achievements of today; and
- (v) provide visible evidence of the continuity between past, present and future.

2. INDIGENOUS CULTURAL HERITAGE

The indigenous peritage of Maori and Moriori relates to family, local and tribal groups and associations. It is inseparable from identity and well-being and has particular cultural meanings.

The Treaty of Waiting is the historical basis for indigenous guardianship. It recognises the indigenous people as exercising responsibility for their treasures, monuments and sacred places. This interest extends beyond current legal ownership wherever such heritage exists. Particular knowledge of heritage values is entrusted to chosen guardians. The conservation of places of indigenous cultural heritage value therefore is conditional on decisions made in the indigenous cummunity, and should preceed only in this context. Indegenous conservation precepts are fluid and take account of the continuity of life and the needs of the present as well as the responsibilities of guardianship and association with those who have good before. In particular, protocols of access, authority and titual are handled at a local level. General principles of ethics and social respect affirm that such protocols should be observed.
